Oct 2, 1789 - The United States Bill of Rights is sent to the States for ratification

GUEST SPEAKER

Lt Col Kenneth R. Sterling is the Commander of Air Force ROTC Detachment 810 and Professor of Aerospace Studies at Baylor University in Waco Texas. In this capacity, he is responsible to the University president and the Commander of AFROTC for recruiting, training, and educating Air Force officer candidates. He is the senior Air Force officer on campus with responsibilities including Detachment Commander, Professor of Aerospace Studies, and Department Chair of Aerospace Studies.

Lt Col Sterling entered the Air Force through the ROTC program at Texas Christian University with a degree in Business Marketing. He subsequently attained a Master of Science in International Relations degree with a National Security focus from Troy University in 2010.

Lt Col Sterling has flown missions in support of USPACOM's Continuous Bomber Presence effort, USSTRATCOM's strategic deterrence mission, and USSOUTHCOM's counter drug mission set. He has deployed to the Pacific area of responsibility five times, including duty as the Bomber Liaison Officer at the 613th Air and Space Operations Center, Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Hawaii.

Additionally, Lt Col Sterling volunteered to deploy to Central America where he planned and supported counter drug, disaster relief, and humanitarian assistance operations.

Finally, during his time at USSTRATCOM, Lt Col Sterling was the Chief of Aircraft Strike responsible for all aircraft planning across USSTRATCOM's mission set, and Air Room liaison officer to NATO Air Command HQ where he coordinated exercises and support to NATO.

<u>MEMBER SPOTLIGHT – BOARD MEMBER –</u> <u>BEAU CROSBY</u>



Col Beau Crosby holds a 1967 B.S. in History from the United States Air Force Academy (USAFA). After graduation, his first USAF assignment (combat) was with the 14th Special Operations Wing in

Vietnam working on AC-47, AC-119, and AC-130 "Gunships." Next, he worked on 612th Tactical Fighter Squadron, F-100 and F-4E fighters at Torrejon Air Base (AB), Spain and Incirlik AB, Turkey. While at Incirlik AB, he stood Nuclear "Victor" alert 18 times. In 1974 Beau received a M.S. in Logistics Management from the Air Force Institute of Technology (AFIT). Afterwards, he became a Controller in the Logistics Readiness Center at the Military Airlift Command headquarters at Scott AFB. Illinois. Next, he joined the cadre that formed 479th Fighter Wing, where 120 T-38s were modified into AT-"Lead in Fighters" that flew 160 sorties a day at Holloman AFB, NM.

Beau separated from active duty after a bitter divorce in 1980 and won custody of his 6 and 8 year old sons. He effectively instilled his values in both sons who later attended and graduated from Southwest Texas State (SWT) college as <u>All American</u> Scholar Athletes (one Road and one Mountain Biker) with 3.0+ GPAs.

As a civilian, Beau worked on stealth technology at a New Mexico site and then joined the 924th Tactical Fighter Group, Air Force Reserves (AFRES) at Bergstrom AFB, TX. In 1988, he was recalled to active duty on the Air Staff (Pentagon) as Director of Aerospace Maintenance, Office of Air Force Reserve and in 1994 transferred to the Air Force DCS Logistics staff. There he was promoted to Colonel after two Passovers with the Reserve. For his time in the Pentagon, he received a Letter of Reprimand from the Air Force Reserve but was awarded a Legion of Merit from the USAF DCS Logistics. Col Crosby holds both Command Aircraft Maintenance and Command Aircraft Supply Officer Badges.

On a Reserve Weekend Operational Readiness Inspection (ORI) at Bergstrom AFB, he met and later married the Light of his Life, Kathy Endres of Alvord, TX. At the time, he was wearing a full Chemical Warfare suit so she had no idea what he looked like when he asked her if he could call her some time. Beau and Kathy have three children and four grandchildren.

While in service, Beau graduated from Air University Squadron Officers School, Air Command and Staff College and Air War College.

Col Crosby's military decorations and awards include the Bronze Star, the Legion of Merit, three Meritorious Service Medals, and two Air Force Commendation Medals, four Air Force Presidential Unit Citations, Army Meritorious Unit Citation, Air Force Outstanding Unit award with "V" device and three oak leaf clusters, Armed Forces Expeditionary Medal – Desert Storm, Vietnam Service Medal with four Battle Stars, and the Republic of Vietnam Cross of Gallantry with Palm.

After retiring from the AF in 1997, he worked for the FAA in Washington, DC. He was the commissioning logistics engineer for the Wide Area Augmentation System (WAAS). WAAS (GPS enhancement) provides improved navigation service by enhancing the accuracy and integrity of position estimates across the National Aerospace System (NAS). Beau's efforts helped bring the program in two weeks early and \$4 million under budget.

Colonel Crosby has been a Volunteer Firefighter with the cities of Woodway, Texas and Red River, New Mexico. He earned and holds both Firefighter and Engineer shields from the Woodway Public Safety Department (Volunteer). While with Woodway, Beau responded to the West Disaster on the second outside truck in. He was awarded Woodway Fire Volunteer of the Year three times and has an advanced Fire Fighting certification from the Texas A&M Extension; and Emergency Vehicle (Ambulance) Operator certification with Red River Fire. Additionally, Beau helped start up the first Volunteer Fire Fighting Company in Kampala, Uganda in March of 2014.

Beau continues to serve as an apprentice cabinet maker with the Waco Habitat for Humanity. Beau is a member of our Heart of Texas Chapter, Military Officers Association for America (MOAA) and has served on our Board of Directors

<u>MEMORIAM – KEN RATAJCZAK</u>

Kenneth James Ratajczak passed from this life on September 11, 2024, after a 7 month battle with heart failure,

Born in South Bend, Indiana, on July 25, 1946. Ken was active throughout life with baseball, tennis, bowling, water volleyball, and officiating baseball and volleyball. He loved the Chicago White Sox and attended their Baseball Fantasy Camp 3 times. He authored a book called The Wrong Man Out about Shoeless Joe Jackson. He visited the Field of Dreams and the Baseball Hall of Fame. He also loved Indiana basketball and the movie Hoosiers.

As a young man, he sought out an appointment to West Point. His path took him first to the Prep School and then West Point, US Military Academy. His military bases included Ft Leonard Wood, Ft Bliss, Ft Sam Houston, Fitzsimons (pediatric internship), Pine Bluff (Chief Medical Officer), Fitzsimons (radiology internship), Ft Dix, to combine 12 years active duty as well as time spent as Texas Army National Guard and Army Reserves to qualify for military retirement and having been promoted to Colonel. He was always grateful to the Army for sending him to Indiana University School of Medicine.

He was active at St Mary Church of the Assumption in Waco, serving as an usher, Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, Lector and active in the Knights of Columbus organization, serving in several capacities including Grand Knight, Faithful Navigator, and District Deputy.

Ken was active in the Heart of Texas Military Officers of America Assn, serving a term as President until weeks before his passing.

Ken is survived by his loving wife of 22 years, Anne; daughter, Laura and husband, Steven Penney of Clifton; precious granddaughters, Madison and Kelsey Penney; son, Kevin Ratajczak and wife, Jennifer and their children, Kyle and Abby all of Hopewell Junction, NY.

ELECTION DAY IS APPROACHING

Deadline to register to vote if needed is Monday, October 7. You can check your voting status at votetexas.gov. You can also register at the site: select Register to Vote and click on SOS online voter registration application and follow the prompts.

Deadline to apply for a ballot by mail is Monday, October 21. Application must be received by October 21, not just postmarked. Voters who are 65 or older, sick or disabled are eligible to vote by mail. Go to votetesax.gov for a full list of qualifiers for voting by mail. Deadline for receipt of ballots by mail is Tuesday, November 5, by 7 pm.

Early in-person voting is from Monday, October 21 to Friday, November 1. Any registered voter can cast a ballot at early voting sites in the county.

Critical Veterans' Bill Remains Stalled: Ask Your Lawmakers to Back the Dole Act

Critical legislation, including a package designed to improve the lives of generations of veterans, their caregivers, and their survivors, remains in limbo as members of Congress prepare to head home for the November election.

MOAA & other veterans advocacy groups continue to press Congress to pass the life-giving and lifesaving Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare Improvement Act (<u>H.R. 8371</u>). This bipartisan bill is central to MOAA's advocacy efforts in the 118th Congress, and despite exhaustive efforts through press conferences and numerous meetings with lawmakers and their staffs, as well as White House officials, the package has not moved forward. As lawmakers gear up to campaign, members of the wider veteran community are left wondering whether their needs will be prioritized once Congress returns after the elections.

The Dole Act represents much more than a comprehensive package of policies. It is a lifeline for veterans and their families, caregivers, and survivors who rely on VA health care and benefits – often as their only source of livelihood. The package includes VA benefits reforms, expanded long-term care services, caregiver program support services, resources for homeless veterans, and assistance for surviving family members, among other improvements.

Impact on Caregivers

The Dole Act is particularly crucial for caregivers. Named after Sen. Elizabeth Dole, a driving force behind VA caregiver program improvements, the bill reflects her commitment to empowering, supporting, and honoring military caregivers.

In 2012, Dole established the Elizabeth Dole Foundation (EDF) to support military caregivers. EDF's 2014 RAND Corporation study, *Hidden Heroes: America's Military Caregivers* was the first comprehensive examination of this population. This week, EDF released a new RAND study, *America's Military and Veteran Caregivers: Hidden Heroes Emerging from the Shadows* during its ninth annual National Convening event in Washington, D.C.

The new study examines changes since 2014 that have affected the caregiver community, such as:

- Aging of the veteran population, and other demographic changes.
- Troop withdrawal from Afghanistan.
- Increased awareness of service member exposure to environmental toxins.
- Legal advances for sexual and gender minority veterans and service members.
- The coronavirus pandemic and associated lockdowns.

There are 105.6 million caregivers in the U.S. today, with 14.4 million caring for wounded, ill, or injured service members or veterans.

Study Recommendations

The RAND study offers nine recommendations to better support caregivers:

- 1. Increase access to mental health and substance use treatment for caregivers and their children.
- 2. Increase opportunities for caregivers to access available financial support, and offer additional financial compensation to caregivers for the work they perform.
- 3. Tailor caregiver support programs to reflect caregivers' diverse preferences and needs.
- 4. Expand and promote home health care considering how caregivers will be affected.
- 5. Focus programmatic and social support within the context of local conditions in which military/veteran caregivers live.
- 6. Encourage health care systems to better integrate caregivers into health care teams.
- 7. Promote work environments that are supportive of caregivers.
- 8. Continue to conduct rigorous evaluations of those initiatives designed to support military and veteran caregivers.
- 9. Continue to conduct research that fully captures the breadth of caregiving and those who serve as caregivers.

Help Congress Finish Its Business

Do not let Congress end this year without passing this important legislation to ensure our nation remains committed to those who selflessly served and sacrificed. Contact your legislators and ask them to pass the Senator Elizabeth Dole 21st Century Veterans Healthcare Improvement Act.
